Supported Independent Living

Supporting clients in specialist disability accommodation to live independently, helping them with daily living and personal care.



Short Term Accommodation and Assistance

Helping clients learn independent living skills and engage with their local community while giving family and carers a chance to take a break from their daily routine.



Therapy Services

Providing therapy services for all ages and abilities, including early childhood intervention, school-aged, adults and multidisciplinary therapy services.



Social Connections

Delivering day programs, including centre and community-based activities, tailored to each client's goals and interests.



Communication and Inclusion Resource Centre

Providing workplace training and specialist consultancy in disability inclusion and access, as well as communication aid development and support, behaviour support and support coordination.



Individualised Living Options – Exploration and Design

Designing personalised support arrangements for clients on tasks like applying for a rental property, to living in a shared home with others.



Disability Employment Services

Providing clients in New South Wales with regular, ongoing support through the job search process and assistance with staying in work.



Macquarie Employment Training Services

Delivering a range of courses for clients, from nationally recognised qualifications to a range of short courses



Packaging Solutions

Providing New South Wales clients with supported employment opportunities where they can earn a wage, learn new skills and make friends.

Working with clients to match skills and ideal workplace conditions with inclusive employers to create a specialised role where their contribution is valued and support needs are recognised.

Scope's Client Advisory Panel (CAP) is the main representative body for Scope clients.

Comprising a diverse group of people with disability, the CAP plays a crucial role in amplifying the voice and perspectives of those using Scope services. Panel members inform Scope's planning, strategy, and decision-making in a safe and supportive environment.

Since its formation in March 2023, the CAP has been actively involved in various key projects and initiatives, including:

After an intensive and highly rewarding mentorship opportunity, Scope's Packaging Solutions team in New South Wales is thriving after studying the Japanese art of *Kaizen* with manufacturing giant, Toyota.

Kaizen is the basis for the 'Toyota way of thinking', and it broadly translates to 'continuous improvement'; something Stephen Price, General Manager Packaging Solutions and his team is passionate about.

"Toyota specialises in educating companies in continuous improvement through the Toyota Production System Support Centre (TSSC)," Stephen said.

"We consulted TSSC because we wanted to improve production and organisation at our packaging solutions sites," he said.

"But, the ultimate goal was to find a way for supervisors to have more time to spend with our supported employees, training them and reaching goals together."

Over six months, a team of TSSC engineers visited Scope's packaging solutions sites and advised on ways they could become more efficient and sustainable.

"Six months, four site visits, many coffees, bundles of sticky notes and reams of butcher's paper later, the project team have come away with amazing learnings on how to make our enterprises more efficient and productive," Stephen said.

"Going forward we will have a dedicated 'Toyota Champion' to work with site managers and staff to continue the Toyota way of thinking, and embed the structures and procedures learnt during the last six months," Stephen said.

In December 2023, Scope unveiled its inaugural Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), which we have since been taking steps to implement.

Scope commissioned Greg Muir*, a First Nations artist with a disability, to design the artwork for the Plan. Titled 'Into Freedom', Greg's work showcases themes of institutionalisation, transition and freedom shared between First Nations and disability communities in Australia.

Celebrating and empowering First Nations employees and people with disability to belong, thrive, and live their dreams is central to our vision.

"In its very essence, our RAP is a testament to our vision and values – by embracing reconciliation, we celebrate diversity and we acknowledge the unique contributions of First Nations people to our nation's culture and heritage," Kate MacRae, Scope's CEO said.

Our RAP amplifies this vision and enables us to create culturally-responsive disability supports, allowing our clients to live the lives they choose.

The plan outlines a series of practical steps that Scope is taking to advance reconciliation within our organisation and across our community. It encompasses commitments to recognise and respect the rights and culture of First Nations people, to provide opportunities for cultural learning and understanding, and to create a workplace that is truly inclusive and diverse.





Supported by funding from Perpetual's IMPACT Philanthropy Application Program, Scope developed and piloted a course for adults with intellectual disability that teaches them about research and how to be co-researchers.

Co-research refers to research carried out 'with' or 'by' people with intellectual disability, rather than 'to,' 'about' or 'for' them.

The course ran from March to May 2024 with eight Scope clients participating as co-researchers. As well as learning about research, the co-researchers also carried out their own research project which involved developing a research question, collecting and analysing data, and reporting the results.

Some of the co-researchers presented their findings to Scope colleagues, families and supporters on how to support people with disability to live independently.

On evaluation of the course, co-researchers reported that they felt positive about the new skills they learned, with many saying they felt more confident about their ability to participate in the planning and implementation of research projects.

Some spoke about the importance of the inclusive and supportive approach taken during the course, and that they appreciated the positive group dynamic and friendships formed.

Sector leadership

Scope has nurtured valuable relationships with other disability service providers and industry groups, including Ability First Australia and National Disability Services. Together, we engaged regularly in collective advocacy to represent our common interests and amplify the voices of people with disability. This has helped to strengthen the disability sector and foster cooperation to highlight the potential impacts of forthcoming changes.

Scope was represented on key external bodies addressing various issues relating to the sector, including developing the disability sector workforce, improving the mental health and wellbeing of people with disability, and enhancing equity in health through improved access to cervical screening for women with disability.

We have responded to a number of calls for submissions across government, including themes discussing disability employment, outcome measurement and the future of group homes.
